#### Bill,

We spent a week at Boondooma Dam fishing every day. We stayed in the bunk house which has 8 rooms each accommodating up to 4 anglers. A communal kitchen fully equipped with crockery, cutlery, cooking utensils, fridges and cookers.

Boondooma is west of Gympie Qld. It has bass, yellowbelly and a few others species and there are red claw yabbies. Considered a pest there is no bag limit but only four opera house traps per fisho is allowed. Bait for these is rock melon, sweet potatoes, carrots, boiled potatoes, zucchini, pumpkin, dog biscuits, seems anything except fish and meat. The larger yabbies are about a foot long but only a third of each has meat—the rest is head. Boil for 3 mins after the water has been brought back to the boil, plunge in cold water, split and the meat falls out. Add to a curry dish, to a pasta dish (with yellowbelly pieces) or eat with a seafood sauce. But back to the fishing. We caught yellowbelly, bass, spangled perch.

A pleasant week, the fishing was slow, the red claw great, accommodation good but the water skiers were a pain—especially on the weekend.

#### SUSSEX SNIPPETS – October/November 2015

The South Coast weather has finally come good and the surface water temperature is in the Basin is now around 20 degrees. The warmer water has certainly made the fish a lot more aggressive. Many locals have been bagging out regularly on good size Flathead & Bream to 40cm. I spotted a huge school of Bream making their way into the Basin last week probably brought in from outside by the recent prawn run.

The water clarity in the Basin is still murky however if we do not get anymore heavy rain it should clear up in the next few weeks. Swan Lake has closed up once again however Berrara Lagoon is still open. This should improve the fishing in this particular estuary system.

There are a few Luderick around in the Inlet and there is now plenty of local weed in Swan Lake.

The real good news is that huge trophy length Flathead are regularly being caught regularly in the Basin. Most fishermen are getting their chance to bag one of these big girls each time they go out but not all get to complete the capture and take a few pics before returning them to fight another day. Most of these trophy fish are from 80 to 120 cm. 75 to 120 mm plastic's in varying colours are the go. Gold flake/root beer colour rip tide lures or Silver Fox Squidgy's are local favourites at the moment.

I was talking to a local angler this morning who related a good story about the size of some of these trophy length Flathead. The story goes like this:

"He had been playing a Bream around 36cm when it suddenly stopped running around and his line became very heavy. When he finally retrieved line and got his Bream to the surface he discovered he had a giant Flathead,( the biggest he has ever seen), with his Bream in its mouth. The fish dropped the Bream when it saw the boat however it immediately grabbed the now dead Bream, once again and continued the fight. The fish hung onto the now dead fish right up to the boat however the Flathead was so large he was sure the head would not fit into his small net, forget the length. He estimated the fish was well over a metre long. Ultimately he poked the fish with the net handle and forced it to let go where it ultimately returned to the murky depths of the Basin" What a fantastic story! Maybe this was the 120 cm fish caught & released last month.

I still have not come to any conclusions regarding the "CRANKA CRAB" lures although various face book reports are still praising them. Hopefully I can get out to fish a little more in the coming month and once again target the Bream. I can say that the Z man grubs in a motor oil colour, are a good all round lures So far I have caught good sized Flathead, Bream and Flounder on these lures.

I will report more on the CRANKA's next month. Bye for now.

## Boondooma Dam.

Located around 20 km northwest of Proston, and 75 km from Kingaroy, Boondooma Dam is a leisurely three and a half hour drive northwest of Brisbane.

The Boondooma Dam was constructed in 1983 across the Boyne river below it's confluence with the Stuart to supply water to the Tarong power station and as is the case at so many impoundments, takes its name from the original property in the area.

It has a capacity of 210 000 mega litres under the 1920 Ha of surface area and has an average depth of 11meters.

Boondooma has had a very mixed stocking history being one of the only impoundments to be stocked with both Murray Cod & Mary River Cod in the past as well as the continued stocking of bass, golden perch, silver perch & saratoga. There is also a naturally occurring population of Tandans (Eel tailed catfish) andspangled perch.

However the main catch is bass and golden perch which can be trolled, cast to, jigged and bait fished. There is a healthy population of shrimp caught in a trap tied to dead trees and left overnight for bait. But the icing on the cake is the handy population of red claw yabbies. Caught in opera house traps baited with sweet potato, rockmelon, zucchini, dog biscuits anything but meat or fish—they are vegetarians. At catch of a dozen in a trap overnight is not uncommon. There are no bag limits as they are considered a pest. Four traps per angler is allowed. And they taste pretty good—not unlike prawns/lobster. The average size would be 15 cm. Good with pasta, with curry, with seafood sauce and au natrurel.

### FishCare Workshop at Jindabyne

Over the long weekend earlier in the month, NSW Fisheries held a FishCare Workshop for kids at Jindabyne. The theatrette at the Gaden Hatchery was used for the lectures—knot tying and Rules/ regulations while casting tuition and playing a fish was held in the grounds.

Most kids—primary school ages, came from the local towns, many from properties in the area.

After a sausage sizzle lunch it was time to put the mornings tuitions into practise. Fishing in Lake Jindabyne? Oh no, no, no, we fished in the Hatchery ponds. Using Tasmanian devils (modified by replacing the treble with a single hook) every cast was a hook up, and if that escaped the lure was soon engulfed by another fish. All kids caught a fish—many catching multiples. All fish caught were placed into a recovery tank by Fisheries staff to be released after the weekend. The fish caught comprised rainbow, brown and brook trout and Atlantic salmon. These were brood stock and fish of a lifetime.

Each child was allowed to keep one fish which Fisheries staff cleaned and put into a plastic bag and on ice until parents picked their child(ren) up.

The cost was \$40 for each child and this include a new rod and reel, a small tackle box with lures and hooks etc, lunch and drinks.

This was repeated with another group the next day.

Exhausting yes, but rewarding.

#### Jindabyne Boat Ramp

Of interest to club members will be the proposed improvements to the boat ramp at Jindabyne. The ramp has had little work carried out other than lengthening and widening as water levels permitted. The skiers have had priority even though they come only once a year in winter. Fishermen come all year and spend on fuel, food, tackle, accommodation, and the like.



The Snowy Rivers Shire Council has the responsibility for the ramp.

The Council had plans drawn in 2010 addressing the issues. The NSW Government has an initiative via the *NSW Boating Statement 2014* where monies (\$33M) has been set aside for work on ramps state-wide. Jindabyne is included (as is Oatley).

An amount has already been given to the Council to prepare plans and costings of the work required, this is expected to be completed in December this year.



The work includes a car park, better access roads, improved access from Kosciuszko Road, toilets, lighting and garbage bins. There is no provision at the moment for fish cleaning facilities or a pontoon. Snowy Mountain Lakes will not allow pontoons because of the high rate of rise of the lake of up to 10m overnight. Looks as if our feet will still get wet and cold.

The NSW Boating Statement requires all monies allocated to be spent and the work completed in three years.

# *FADs Update* 21 October 2015 2015/16 FADs season commences



The 2015/16 Fish Aggregating Devices (FADs) season has commenced with the deployment of 22 FADs (see below). The FAD deployment season coincides with the East Australian Current as it pushes down the NSW coastline. These conditions are ideal for fishing around FADs as the warm water holds travelling pelagic fish species such as Mahi Mahi, Marlin and Wahoo.



A new FAD will be deployed this season at **Narooma**, bringing the total number of FADs being deployed for the 2015/16 fishing period to 30.

The remaining FADs will be progressively deployed. The DPI <u>website</u> will be kept up to date with the deployment status of your local FAD.

# Bird Of The Month



# Sacred Kingfisher Todiramphus Sanctus

The Sacred Kingfisher is not a seabird or a shorebird, but is normally found near water.

**Appearance**. Similar shape to a Laughing Kookaburra but about half the size. The male has a dark blue-green cap, buff eyebrow and a dark mask behind the eye. Wings and tail are blue, the back green and the collar and underparts vary from white to buff. The female has somewhat greener wings and is more buff underneath. The large, robust bill is black above and lighter below.

**Habitat**. Open forest and woodlands along the margins of inland and coastal waterways, mangroves, mudflats etc. In urban areas often perches on TV antennas, utility wires or high dead branches.

**Range.** Common resident in Northern Australia and coastal Qld. Breeding migrant to SE and SW, Sept to March. Absent from arid interior.

**Breeding.** 3-4 rounded white eggs are laid in a tree hollow, tree-termite nest or riverbank tunnel. Incubation 17-18 days. Young leave the nest after 24-26 days.

**Feeding**. In spite of its name the Sacred Kingfisher only occasionally feeds on fish. Its diet consists mainly of small reptiles, crustaceans, insects and their larvae.

Voice. A high pitched "dek dek dek".

**Similar Species.** The Collared Kingfisher has a small white patch in front of the eye, cleaner white underparts and is strictly coastal from the NSW border north, around to Shark Bay in WA. The Forest Kingfisher has a similar white spot but is a turquoise blue on the back, not green. It is found in coastal eastern Australia and Cape York around to the WA border.
