FISHING REPORTS


G'day Bill,

Since the last newsletter I have made about 8 trips to the Woronora River and one to the Georges River. There have been a couple of trips that resulted in donuts but in total I have got 4 Bream, 5 Flathead, 1 Luderick, 2 Trevally and 1 Estuary Perch. All fish taken on lures and the best day was 4 fish. There are no bloodworms at the tackle shop as it is still forbidden to bring them across the border from Queensland. There are usually tube worms available.

Hi Bill, two weeks the swell has been down, and the fishing on the rocks has been variable. I have fished three times for kingfish with varying results. It's very quiet for most of the day until around the tide change, when there seems to be a 20-30 minute burst of kings that arrive. Most days I get one or two but on one day



we had a hectic 30 minutes with triple hookups. These fish range from 66 to 74cm. There are plenty of large green eyed squid along the rocks, especially early morning and when the shadows from the cliffs move out over the water. The water temperature is ranging from 18.4 to 19.8C at the moment and with this, strange combinations of fish are occurring: frigate mackerel mixed with barracouta.

On one real calm day last week I walked into a few locations around Burning Palms to check out some rock blackfish locations. The swell was non existent so I was not to confident about getting any fish as there were no washes present for cover. I did manage 3 nice pan size rock blackfish at one location - up to 30cm. At another location burlied up and found plenty of trevally and rock blackfish, again around the 30 cm size. Both locations were in the shadows of the cliffs. This time of the year it's hard fishing with lots of time output for small results but still enjoyable.

Bate Bay Outing

On the Thursday before the weekend outing, Chris Holland, Trevor Dean and myself did a trial run over the fishing grounds we hoped to use on the following Saturday. Wind was okay, water temp 19°, swell not too bad and the drift good.

Using a variety of baits we bagged 18 fish. These were mostly flatties to about 48cm with a couple of good sized flounder, had plenty of bites, and released quite a few legal fish. During the day we caught a wide variety including stargazer, hairtail, slimy mackerel, snapper, flathead, flounder, shovelnose shark, cuttlefish and a yellow & black striped thing!

On the Saturday, several people cancelled due to unforeseen circumstances so just Ron Camp and myself fished the Bate Bay outing. We started off on the grounds previously tried on the Thursday with Trevor and Chris, but after landing one nice flattie and two good flounder, we decided the wind was a bit fresh for two old guys and the sea a bit sloppy, so moved and fished the 10-14m depths off Wanda and Elouera Beaches.

There were plenty of flathead (we bagged out), and two more good flounder before we called it a day. The flatties were a good pan size, not huge but it was a great outing with plenty of meal size fish.

Fishing St Georges Basin by John Everett



St Georges Basin was declared a Recreational Fishing Haven in 2002 and is located near Jervis Bay, about



2.5 hours' drive south of Sydney. The area is famous for its dusky flathead and other popular trophy estuary sportfish and hosts numerous professional fishing competitions during the year.

The Basin is classified as an open intermediate waterway (an inland sea), and is linked to the sea via Sussex Inlet on its southern side. It is fed by Tomerong and Wandandian Creeks to the north, has a catchment area of approximately 316 square kilometres and a surface area 41 square kilometres with an average depth of about 5m, (but contains significant areas of 8m or more).

Several small towns and villages including Basin View, Sanctuary Point and Old Erowal Bay adjoin the Basin on its northern shoreline.

Numerous fish species are found in the Basin and estuaries including bream, flathead, luderick, whiting, snapper and tailor. Those fishing the waterways should consider any outing to be potentially a trophy fish capture day, not just a chance to 'bag out'. Anglers should aim for an average 4-6 good fish per outing, although we have had days of up to 18 good fish. The fish of the area are often elusive and it is not uncommon to change fishing locations numerous times to locate them.

The Basin is surrounded by relatively untouched tree-line shores and boasts shallow, flathead friendly areas on its perimeter (especially the eastern, southern and west shorelines), with deeper areas common for bream and snapper which tend to school, resulting in better catch numbers. Fishers should look for sea floor drop-offs and short length weed in Swan Bay, Jewfish Bay and One Tree Bay to target the flathead grounds.

Standard rigs are used for bait and lure fishing, with plastics and deep divers successful at the Basin edges and live bait and peeled prawns in the deeper areas. In the shallower areas, hard-bodies are also very successful for all fish species.

Sussex Inlet is good for luderick, bream and whiting with green weed usually available near Swan Lake, a very short drive to the south.






An advantage of fishing the area is its adaptability during inclement weather. If the Basin is too windy, fish for luderick or bream in the estuaries. Evening fishing in Sussex Inlet for bream usually yields fish.



For anglers, the area offers the chance to fish in relatively seclusion, over a vast protected waterway, with the chance to land that competition winning fish. Why go?

- Estuary is great for children to fish
- Water temperature does not seem to matter
- Trophy fish are there
- Weather dictates the species
- To try different baits, lures & places



All is not what it seems......

Returning to the boat ramp quite smug with our catch – the first hurdle however after retrieving the boat was where to clean all these fish? There were no fish cleaning tables so there were only three options left. Clean 'em on the pontoon (messy), on the logs nearby (no water) or take home (even more messy). So we decided on the pontoon. There were only a couple of boat trailers left in the car park so we were not likely to be embarrassed by too many anglers. The pontoon happened to be at the right height and while near the water our feet were dry.

It took about an hour to scale, head and gut the fish—we weren't in a hurry.

The fish were rinsed and the pontoon cleaned, the fish were loaded into the boat, we were done.


Having completed the task, straightened our backs, and took a spell. We wandered around and for some reason, looked up at Fisheries Fish ID sign alongside the ramp. We looked through the most common fish, flathead, bream, jewies and noted the minimum lengths and bag limits, we came across luderick. The sign said *Luderick, bag limit 10 per person, and minimum length 27cms*. We were dumbstruck, amazed, confused, flabbergasted – as the figures on the sticker in the boat was 20 fish per person, and minimum length 25cms. How could this be. The Fisheries sign must be incorrect, surely.

However, a check on the date of the said sticker had the date, 2010. it looked at first this was a misprint, but on further examination *2010 was correct*. It seems the error was ours/mine. It meant all the fish the crew had kept were sus, mine however were good.

Now, what to do (other than sack the crew)???

As the fish had been beheaded at this stage, the sizes would be difficult to determine, so

- We could go to Fisheries and fess up, or
- We could toss the suspect fish back, or
- Go home, and get a new sticker we went home.



Bird Of The Month

Australian Reed-Warbler Acrocephalus australis



Other Names Clamorous Reed-Warbler; Reedbird; Reedlark; Water Sparrow

This months bird is by no means a Seabird, nor even a Waterbird, but nevertheless we are likely to encounter it when we are fishing around its normal habitat, the reeds and rushes bordering fresh water streams and rivers, ponds, lakes and dams as well as swamps and wetlands.

Appearance. A small Sparrow-sized bird (16-17 cm), olive-brown above, pale fawnish white below. The pinkish-orange inside of the mouth is often exposed when singing.

Habitat and range. Prefers areas with dense growth of vertical stems, especially Cumbungi, phragmites, reeds and pencil-rush. More often heard than seen, but not especially shy. Flits from one clump of vegetation to the next. Also perches on twigs of adjacent trees, but always close to the cover of the reeds. In winter most birds migrate to northern regions and tropics.

Breeding. September to December. Three to four eggs in a cup shaped nest made from reed sheaths, wrapped around reed stems.

Diet. Feeds on insects and other invertebrates both in the vegetation and on adjacent ground.

Call. As mentioned the call is the most notable feature of this bird. Described as "rich, liquid, guttural phrases, 'chutch chutch, dzee-dzee, quarty-quarty'. Hear it here
